Community Health Needs and Assets Assessment Process

A Community Health Needs and Assets Assessment (CHNAA) is a way to understand the health of a community by reviewing data and information from community members about their health needs and priorities. That data and information can then be used to help shape programs to address those concerns and to reduce inequities.


NYU Langone Hospital--Long Island (formerly known as Winthrop University Hospital and earlier as Nassau Hospital) has served communities across Nassau and Suffolk Counties since 1896. Every three years we are required to do a Community Health Needs and Assets Assessment and develop a plan, called a Community Service Plan, to identify community priorities and implement programs to address these needs.

Residents from Hempstead (Incorporated Village of Hempstead) utilize services at NYU Langone Hospital--Long Island. We wanted to better understand how we can best serve the Hempstead community as part of our <u>2022-2024 Community Service Plan</u>.

The best way to understand the needs, priorities, and assets of a community is to have community partners and residents help design and implement the process for assessing needs and assets. Beginning in July 2021, local community-based organizations and NYU Langone faculty and staff held monthly meetings to identify what is known and what information is missing about community health needs, assets, and priorities. The group reviewed available data, interviewed individual staff and community members, and hosted six group discussions with thirty-seven participants.


This report summarizes the findings from the needs and assets assessment. The numbers used in this report are based on a snapshot from the most recent year of data available. These data alone cannot explain why these patterns exist or how they are affected by the legacies of structural racism and community disinvestment. The numbers alone do not tell the whole story of the community. Input and insights from talking with community members and community-based organizations were key to understanding the strengths and needs in Hempstead.

Methods Used for Community Health Needs and Assets Assessment




Review public data

Look at data collected by government agencies and organizations.




Survey community groups

Ask community members directly about their thoughts.




Share results

Hempstead Community Assets

The Incorporated Village of Hempstead was established in 1853 and today is the most populous village in Nassau County with 59,000 residents according to the 2020 Census. Hempstead is a vibrant, diverse, family-oriented community. Long-time residents described a number of neighborhood areas including Parkside, Trackside, The Heights, Midway, The Hills and The Desert. Community members identified a number of assets, including the public library, places of worship, African American Museum of Nassau County, commercial districts, parks, and the Rosa Parks Transit Center.




The Village of Hempstead's civic center serves as the town seat for the Town of Hempstead

The Rosa Parks Transit Center is a vital transportation hub for the Long Island Railroad (LIRR) and Nassau Inter-County Express (NICE) bus system




St. George's Church, one of the earliest Episcopal congregations on Long Island, listed on the National Register of Historic Places, is one of many faith-based institutions serving the community

Community Conversations: Top Assets

In conversations with community-based organizations and community members, some key themes emerged when discussing what they loved about Hempstead:

Key Themes



People

People in Hempstead (Hempsteadians) are an asset. People are friendly, they say hello, they are willing to help. The diversity of the people in the community is valued. People are resilient, honest, and supportive of each other. There is a strong focus on family.



Places


Many community members highlighted places in Hempstead as assets, including: convenient location, public library, numerous parks, public transportation options, diverse places of worship, and cultural amenities such as the African American Museum of Nassau County.



Support

A number of resources are available in the community when help is needed. For example, more than fifty community-based service organizations are located in the community. In addition, a number of diverse places of worship provide services and support.






Community Snapshot: Population

Population Growth

The population of Hempstead has grown in the past two decades and today is home to 59,000 residents. This growth is driven by an increase in the Hispanic/Latinx population, which today numbers nearly 30,000 accounting for 50% of the population. Between 2000 and 2020, there has been a decrease in the number of Black residents; in 2020, 39% of the population was Black, down from 51% in 2000.


Hempstead Population: 2000-2020

Most residents in Hempstead identify as Hispanic/Latinx or Black. In Nassau County, the majority of residents identify as White.



Community Snapshot: Population

About 4 out of 10 Hempstead residents are immigrants




The top birth countries for Hempstead immigrants are:

Language spoken at home

Nearly one-half of Hempstead residents ages 5 years or older speak a language other than English at home, compared with 29% in Nassau County.




41% of Hempstead residents ages 5 years or older speak Spanish.

Among Spanish speakers in Hempstead, 62% speak English less than very well.

As one community member highlighted, many immigrants leave their lives behind and must start over when they arrive in Hempstead. Some have fled violence and poverty in their home countries. Others followed family members who settled in Hempstead, further strengthening the strong family ties within the community. Many come to Hempstead speaking only Spanish and the lack of bilingual services and information can be a barrier to accessing care and other needs. In addition, anti-immigrant rhetoric and fear of deportation for themselves or family members can impact access to needed services. Yet, this shared sense of experience also contributes to the sense of belonging.

Educational attainment




74% of Hempstead residents ages 25 years or older have at least a high school degree, compared with 92% of Nassau County residents

High school graduation and chronic absenteeism



Chronic absenteeism, defined as missing at least ten percent of school days, was an issue in many school districts during the 2020-21 school year.

In Hempstead, 92% of high school students were chronically absent in school year 2020-21, a time when remote and hybrid learning options were in place due to the COVID pandemic.


While educational attainment in part reflects limited educational opportunities available in countries outside the US, for many years high school graduation rates for Hempstead were lower than other communities, although gains have been made more recently. COVID-19 further disrupted education for many students. In school year 2020-21, a time of hybrid and remote learning options, chronic absenteeism was very high in Hempstead. Some attribute the lack of school bus transportation to high school as a factor in preventing students from getting to school.

Parents in the community spoke about the importance of education for their children. In February 2020, New York State assigned a monitor to oversee operations of the Hempstead School District. Private and charter schools in the area are expensive or based on a lottery admission process, further adding stress to parents concerned about how to provide their children with better educational opportunities.

Community Snapshot: Economic

Income

Average household income in Nassau County is about twice as high as Hempstead.




In Nassau County, 25% of households earn \$200,000 or more per year.


Many of the focus group participants and community partners mentioned financial insecurity as a struggle in the community. In part, limited employment opportunities mean that residents can only find work in low-wage occupations and often have to work multiple jobs to support themselves and their families. Limited income was also noted as a barrier to accessing healthcare, particularly preventive services.



Hempstead housing stock is made up of a larger percentage of multi-unit dwellings than Nassau County

34% of housing units in Hempstead are in buildings with ten or more units.

12% of Hempstead housing units are classified as crowded (1.01 or more people per room).

A legacy of discriminatory mortgage lending practices, exclusionary zoning, and racial steering in the real estate market continues to shape the housing landscape in Hempstead and Nassau County. High taxes further contribute to limiting home ownership options for many residents. Four public housing developments, including two dedicated to housing seniors, provide a vital resource for affordable housing options in Hempstead.

Focus group participants noted the need for affordable housing, as well as services and housing for people experiencing homelessness. Some noted that multiple generations of a family live together, providing valued family support but also resulting in crowding.

Community Snapshot: Transportation

Transportation

Hempstead is a major transit hub for the Long Island Railroad (LIRR) and Nassau Inter-County Express (NICE) bus routes.

The percent of households with no vehicle access is three times higher in Hempstead than Nassau County.



While Hempstead has more public transportation options than other communities, transportation was noted as a barrier in a number of cases. For example, some focus group participants reported that a lack of transportation contributed to late or missed medical appointments. The Nassau County Comptroller's Office identified three census tracts in Hempstead as being food deserts due to low percent of households having access to a vehicle and distance from a supermarket. Lack of transportation was also noted as a factor in the high rate of chronic absenteeism among students.

Community Snapshot: Health Care Access

Health insurance

The percent of adults ages 19 to 64 years who do not have health insurance is three times higher in Hempstead than Nassau County.



Nearly all children and older adults in Hempstead and Nassau County have health insurance.

Children in Hempstead are more likely to have public insurance (58%) than children in Nassau County (19%).

Potentially avoidable hospitalization rate is higher in Hempstead than Nassau County.




Potentially avoidable hospitalizations may be prevented with better access to primary care.

Timely screening rates for cervical cancer and breast cancer are similar in Hempstead and Nassau County. Timely screening rates for colon cancer are lower in Hempstead.



Community Snapshot: Health Outcomes and Behaviors (Adults)

Chronic disease

Rates of obesity, high blood pressure, diabetes, and current asthma are higher for adults in Hempstead than Nassau County.



The opioid burden rate is higher in Hempstead than Nassau County.



Asthma-related Emergency Department visit rate among children is higher in Hempstead than Nassau County.




Hempstead zip code 11550 has the highest rate of asthma-related ED visits among children of all Nassau County zip codes.

The percent of public school students with obesity is higher in Hempstead than Nassau County.




Overall, 26% of public school students in Hempstead school district are obese compared with 16% in Nassau County.

Teen pregnancy rate is higher in Hempstead than Nassau County.





Community Conversations: Top Needs

In conversations with community-based organizations and community members, some key themes emerged when discussing needs in Hempstead:

Key Themes




Healthcare access

Community members highlighted a need for improved access to healthcare, including addressing language and transportation barriers; additional sites offering low-cost or sliding scale payment options; and a 24-hour pharmacy.



Environment and exercise

While there are a number of local parks, community members highlighted the need for expanded park hours, additional structured activities, and improvements to park safety to promote exercise and well-being.



Healthy food

Community members noted that food prices and lack of access to nutritious foods made it hard to stay healthy.

"It is often difficult because you go to the doctors and there are no staff members who speak Spanish. It makes it difficult to access care".



Overview

As part of the <u>NYU Langone Health Community Service Plan</u>, four programs are available for the Hempstead community, and beyond, to help improve health and wellbeing. These programs align with the New York State Prevention Agenda priority areas to: Prevent Chronic Disease; Promote Healthy Women and Children; and Promote a Healthy and Safe Environment.

Stanford Chronic Disease Self-Management

Evidence-based education series facilitated by registered nurses in community setting, such as public libraries, to help people with chronic diseases manage their symptoms and live healthy lives.

Family Support Services

Evidence-informed program that supports childhood health and development through family social needs screening and care coordination. Includes Reach Out and Read program that delivers books and messaging about importance of reading at routine pediatric checkups.

A Matter of Balance

Evidence-based eight session exercise program to reduce the fear of falling and increase activity levels among older adults offered in hospital and community settings.

Tai Chi for Arthritis and Fall Prevention

Evidence-based fall risk-reduction programs for adults over age 60 years in hospital and community settings.
